# Minutes of the 2<sup>nd</sup> State Water and Sanitation Mission (SWSM) Executive Committee meeting held on 15-12-2021, 4.00pm through Video Conference

Meeting Commenced at 4.00 PM.

Sri. T.K. Jose, IAS, Additional Chief Secretary, Water Resources Department, Kerala chaired the meeting and welcomed all the participants. Sri. Venkatesapathy S., IAS, Managing Director KWA and Mission Director JJM Kerala explained about implementation and progress of Jal Jeevan Mission in Kerala to the committee. The presentation made is attached as Annexure-2. After the brief presentation, MD presented the agenda points to the committee.

### Agenda - 1: Operation and Maintenance (O&M) policy for the schemes implemented under Jal Jeevan Mission.

Jal Jeevan Mission Project is implemented under the Local Self Government Institutions in their ownership. Kerala Water Autority (KWA), Kerala Rural Water Supply & Sanitation Agency (KRWSA) and Ground Water Department (GWD) are the implementing agencies executing the projects on behalf of the respective Panchayats.

As per JJM National Operational Guidelines, Management and O&M of the water supply scheme and recovery of user charges is by the Gram Panchayat and/ or its sub-committee, i.e. VWSC/ Paani Samiti/ User Group, etc. Govt. of India has informed vide DO letter No. W-11011/49/2021-JJM-I DDWS dt. 18/5/2021 of AS & Mission Director, NJJM & Letter No. No. W-11011/49/2021-JJM.I-DDWS dt. 27/10/2021 of Director, NJJM, that for assured water supply and sustainability of systems, it is important that proper O&M policy is put in place wherein water user charges is to be collected to meet the recurring expenditure for assured potable tap water supply to users on regular basis without any disruption. Also requested that the O&M policy of the State for assured tap water supply to every rural home may be framed and adopted and a copy of the same may also be shared with GOI.

In Kerala, majority of the rural water supply schemes are currently operated and maintained by KWA and user charges are collected by KWA. If the panchayats decide and agree to entrust the O&M with KWA authorizing to collect the user charges, KWA can take up the O&M of the schemes implemented. It must be done with the consent & approval of the government.

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In the case of Bulk water supply schemes implemented, the responsibility of the implementing agency (KWA) ends at the point of Bulk meter and after that the concerned user groups/Panchayats has to take care of the O&M of such schemes and charges of bulk water to be paid to the implementing agencies.

The agenda was presented before the committee for discussion and giving consent regarding submitting recommendation to Government in this regard.

#### **Decisions:**

After detailed discussions, the committee decided to give consent for submitting recommendation to Government regarding the O&M policy to be adopted for JJM scheme as follows:

- 1) In Kerala, majority of the rural water supply schemes are currently operated and maintained by KWA and user charges are collected by KWA. If the panchayats decide and agree to entrust the O&M with KWA authorizing to collect the user charges, KWA can take up the O&M of the schemes implemented. It must be done with the consent & approval of the government.
- 2) In the case of Bulk water supply schemes implemented, the responsibility of the implementing agency ends at the point of Bulk meter and after that the concerned user groups/Panchayats has to take care of the O&M of such schemes and charges of bulk water to be paid to the implementing agencies.

## Agenda - 2: Key Resource Centres (KRC) empanelled by NJJM for Training and Capacity Building Activities- Revised Guideline issued by NJJM-Giving consent to the four day Residential Training Programmes of Community Level.

National Jal Jeevan Mission (NJJM) had prepared a frame work for a 4 day Training for Level 3 (Community Level) participants, to be executed by Key Resource Centres (KRCs), in all States/UTs. Accordingly, the AAPs submitted by 6 out of 7 shortlisted KRCs in Kerala, were placed before the 1st SWSM Executive Committee held on 12.10.2021 and as decided by the Committee, the AAPs were forwarded to GoK for consent; for forwarding to NJJM for approval.

Now, NJJM has issued a new guideline two 4-day residential programmes with max. 60 participants in any of the assigned States shall be done by the KRCs and that more

programmes shall be assigned after assessment of the two programmes. These training programmes are arranged and funded by NJJM directly and the state does not have any financial obligation.

Based on the above decision of NJJM, KRCs shortlisted for Kerala were requested to forward Programme Chart for Two Programmes in Kerala. Responses received from the KRCs are tabulated and presented in the following chart

#### Decision:

The committee decided to give consent as per guidelines to the Training details forwarded by the KRCs to forward to NJJM for approval.

#### Supplementary Agenda No. 1

#### **Deployment of Implementation Support Agencies (ISAs)**

The Kerala Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Agency (KRWSA) was entrusted with the responsibility of short listing and deployment of Implementation Support Agencies (ISAs) in Panchayats.

On behalf of State Water and Sanitation Mission (SWSM), after due process, KRWSA has shortlisted 49 agencies as ISAs. Subsequently two agencies have informed their difficulties and opted out of the short list. As required in the JJM guidelines, the District Water and Sanitation Missions (DWSM) have appointed 47 ISAs in 941 GPs.



Later 3 ISAs, which were assigned in 22 GPs, have withdrawn from the project due to their own reasons. For these 22 GPS, the ISAs yet to be appointed. In these GPs, 8 ISAs including Kudumbasree have come forward.

The agenda was presented before the committee to decide about assigning ISA to the 22 GPs.

#### **Decision:**

The committee decided that being a government agency, Kudumbasree can be given preference in assigning as ISA to the 22 GPs.

#### Additional items discussed in the meeting and decisions:

- 1) ACS-WRD directed that more IEC activities be carried out for creating awareness among citizens, Panchayat authorities, etc. regarding the Jal Jeevan Mission programme. Also, put up JJM stalls in various exhibitions and events; give JJM awareness programmes through Akashavani, FM radio, etc. IEC materials to be distributed to Gram Sabhas, Panchayats, etc.
- 2) Under ARISE programme of Kudumbasree, steps shall be taken to empower and give skilling to women plumbers to do plumbing maintenance works in houses. Kudumbasree to identify two women minimum under the jurisdiction of each section office of KWA for imparting training. They shall be properly accompodated in
- 3) More local people to be made skilled in the categories such as Pump operators, Plumbers, Electrician, Fitters, Mason through KASE within March 2022. KWA, KRWSA, Kudumbasree and KASE to join together to impart skills for 1000 people by March 2022.

The meeting concluded at 5.30 PM.
